The Closed Session Meeting of the Petersburg City Council was held on Tuesday, September 19, 2023, at the Petersburg Public Library. Mayor Parham called the Closed Session Meeting to order at 3:01 p.m.

He stated that the amount of school bus stops is a lot and that there is a lot of traffic on this road. He stated that the citizens were fully disadvantage. He stated that the citizens were not fully aware of what is currently being proposed for the site and area.

Sandy Graham, Attorney of Williams Mullen, stated that information was provided and that a letter was also written and sent out to council to give background on some of the issues.

2. <u>PRAYER</u>:

Mayor Parham stated that Vice Mayor Hill will lead the city council meeting in the opening prayer.

Vice Mayor Hill led the city council meeting in the opening prayer.

3. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

Mayor Parham led the council and the citizens in the pledge of allegiance.

4. DETERMINATION OF THE PRESENCE OF A QUORUM:

A quorum was determined with the presence of all city council members.

5. PROCLAMATIONS/RECOGNITIONS/PRESENTATION OF CEREMONIAL PROCLAMATIONS:

a. Presentation and update on Virginia Avenue School Project.

Avram Fechter, Managing Director of Equity Plus and developer of Virginia Avenue School, gave an update on the project.

Key points:

- Virginia Avenue School is turning in 49 senior apartments, 46 rental single-family homes within walking distance of the school and 18 homes in the neighborhood that will be homeownership.
- They have been working with the city for the last two years.
- The project has been stalled for the last year and a half for two reasons. Virginia as a state ran out of tax bond allocation authority for all new projects that year. January, they submitted again and were awarded the bond.
- They anticipate that work will begin around Thanksgiving.
- Electrical equipment could take one year to get everything shipped and received.

There was a discussion between the city council and Mr. Fechter.

Mayor Parham requested if they could remove the spray paint of obscenities from off the building.

b. To present Triad Metals International with the 2023 Industrial Manufacturer of the Year Award.

Mayor Parham stated, "In the Industrial Manufacture Year Award to manufacture or producer, big or small operating in the industry sector, this award recognizes businesses that are using effective strategies to approve competitiveness and profitability. The recipient's operation demonstrates a leadership position within the industry sector while maximizing profitability and customer values. The success of Triad Metals International reflects the dedication and enthusiasm of you and your staff. Your business is a staple here in the Petersburg Community that continues to contribute to the economic vitality of the City of Petersburg."

Mr. Moore stated that the city is working with them from Pittsburgh and with the Chamber of Commerce. He stated that he will work on getting that award to them.

Council Member Myers made a motion to approve the consent agenda. Vice Mayor Hill seconded the motion. The motion was approved on voice call. On voice vote, voting yes: Jones, Smith-Lee, Myers, Westbrook, Hill, and Parham; Abstain: Cuthbert

8. OFFICIAL PUBLIC HEARINGS:

a. A public hearing and consideration of an ordinance approving a petition to rezone the property located at 2225 Jamestown Road, from A, Agricultural Zoning District to M-1, Light Industrial Zoning District, and 2262 County Drive, from B-2, General Commercial Zoning District to M-1, Light Industrial Zoning District.

BACKGROUND: The City of Petersburg received a Petition to rezone the property located at 2255 Jamestown Road, PIN: 040030005 from A, Agricultural Zoning District to M-1, Light Industrial Zoning District, and 2262 County Drive, PIN: 040030006 from B-2, General Commercial Zoning District to M-1, Light Industrial Zoning District.

The purpose of the rezoning is to permit the construction of buildings for the operation of a light industrial and warehouse uses and the proposed use is permitted in the M-1 district. The current Comprehensive Plan Future Land Use Plan identifies the property as commercial.

The Planning Commission held a Public Hearing and considered a resolution with a recommendation to the City Council regarding the petition during the June 1, 2023, meeting.

During the Public Hearing, the representative from the applicant/Developer spoke.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the City Council holds a Public Hearing and considers an Ordinance approving a Petition to rezone the property located at 2255 Jamestown Road, from A, Agricultural Zoning District to M-1, Light Industrial Zoning District, and 2262 County Drive, from B-2, General Commercial Zoning District to M-1, Light Industrial Zoning District.

Naomi Siodmok, Director of Planning & Community Development, gave an update on the request.

Mayor Parham opened the floor for public comments.

Joe Battiston, 1 South Sycamore Street, stated that he is speaking in favor of the project. He stated that this will add jobs and additional funds of tax revenue for the City of Petersburg. He stated that he thinks that this should pass unanimously because it would be good for the city.

Ray Ferguson, 2476 Poe Lane, stated that he thinks that this is a win and lose project for the city. He stated that it is a win for the city but a loss for the citizens that live near this property. He stated that there are a couple hundred properties that are near this property. He stated that letters were sent out but the people in the trailer parks do not know what is going on and that this has not been done properly. He stated that there has not been information received from Fort Gregg-Adams or from the schools. He stated for this to be approved they would need all the information and that they do not have it and neither did the Planning Commission. He stated that if this is approved then there are a lot of risks that will be taken.

Keith Boswell, President & CEO of Virginia Gateway Region, stated that he likes Mr. Ferguson comments. He stated that it is a win for the city. He stated that he cannot speak to the residents but that is something that the city is looking at. He stated that there is a dearth of this type of industrial site in the community. He stated that he represents seven regions and that they are looking for industrial properties like this. He stated that there are good road systems and people that make and move things within the city.

Michael Edwards, 409 Grove Avenue, stated that he is an appointed member of the Planning Commission. He stated that he was one of the ones that raised a concern the most. He stated that he initially voted to deny it but now after going through the information again he would like the project to be approved. He stated that he did mention about the amount of school bus stops and transit stops that are within the area.

Richard Burgess, 2490 Poe Lane, stated that he has a number of concerns regarding this area. He stated that they feel that there are more appropriate types of developments for this area. He stated that they did not deny the ACQUA Apartment complex when he was on the Planning Commission during that time. He stated that it is a gated community and has served the city well. He stated that they would like to see something that is more addressed to the City of Petersburg in the public sector itself like a grocery store that can benefit the citizens of Petersburg.

Carl Vanderburg, 2404 County Drive, stated that the last time that he was present at a council meeting he asked about an acceleration lane on the east bound exit out of the property. He stated that he needs to know how far the lane will go. He stated that if it goes too far and takes part of his land then he will not be able to rent his property anymore. He stated that he has eight units. He stated that he would like to know what it looks like. He stated that everyone that lives on Poe Lane has the same question.

Jim Wheeler, 2156-74 County Drive, stated that he agrees with Mr. Jones. He stated that he thinks that some of the solutions can come from a stop light being there. He stated that there are now two places that slow down the traffic in the area now. He stated that in the City of Petersburg, they cannot afford to not have anymore revenue. He stated that there is never going to be a building that is going to have housing there. He

stated that the city would need \$8 million dollars' worth of improvement of sewer and water. He stated that it is not going to happen overnight. He stated that warehousing is a great project for it. He stated that there does need to be a reduction in the speed limit. He stated that he is all for the project.

Mayor Parham closed the public hearing.

There was discussion and comments among staff and the city council.

Council Member Jones made a motion to approve the ordinance approving a petition to rezone the property located at 2255 Jamestown Road, from A, Agricultural Zoning District to M-1, Light Industrial Zoning District, and 2262 County Drive, from B-2, General Commercial Zoning District to M-1, Light Industrial Zoning District. Council Member Myers seconded the motion. The motion was approved on roll call vote. On roll call vote, voting yes: Cuthbert, Jones, Smith-Lee, Myers, Westbrook, Hill, and Parham

Anthony Williams, City Attorney, gave a brief overview of the request.

Mayor Parham opened the public hearing for public comments.

Barbara Rudolph, 1675 Mt. Vernon Street, stated that the city attorney mentioned a couple of times about applications for the Arts Council. She stated that she is not aware of when that information was advertised. She stated that it appeared that the earlier list came from Council Member Myers. She stated that she hopes that they will open this up to the public.

Seeing no further hands, Mayor Parham closed the public hearing.

Council Member Myers made a motion to approve the ordinance to amend 21-2 of the City Code – Arts Council Terms of Office. Council Member Westbrook seconded the motion. The motion was approved on roll call vote. On roll call vote, voting yes: Cuthbert, Jones, Smith-Lee, Myers, Westbrook, Hill, and Parham

Russell, Tiara Russell, Tamara Tazewell, and TyAsia T. Williams. Vice Mayor Hill seconded the motion. The motion was approved on roll call vote. On roll call vote, voting yes: Cuthbert, Jones, Smith-Lee, Myers, Westbrook, Hill, and Parham

Vice Mayor Hill made a motion to direct the City Manager to appoint an administrative liaison to the Petersburg Area Arts Council. Council Member Myers seconded the motion. The motion was approved on roll call vote. On roll call vote, voting yes: Cuthbert, Jones, Smith-Lee, Myers, Westbrook, Hill, and Parham

c. A public hearing and consideration of adoption of an ordinance to authorize the exchange of real property with the Estate of William A. Patton.

Mayor Parham stated that this item has been tabled until October 2023.

d. Consideration of an appropriation ordinance and a public hearing on September 19, 2023, to increase the Urban Highway Maintenance funding for Street Operations in FY24 in the amount of \$1,066,269.33.

BACKGROUND: In accordance with Section 33.2-319 of the Code of Virginia, the payment rates per lane mile for street payments have been updated every FY. These payments are approved by the Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) and are made at the end of each quarter of the FY by Electronic Data Interface (EDI). The City of Petersburg receives this information every year after the FY budget has already been approved and adopted by the City Council. The Department of Public Works & Utilities then presents the amount of increase or decrease to be approved by the City Council which increases or decreases the approved & adopted budget.

RECOMMENDATION: The Department of Public Works recommends that the City Council approves the increase of Urban Highway Maintenance funding in the amount of \$1,066,269.33.

Randall Williams, Department of Public Works, gave an update on the hearing and request.

Mayor Parham opened the public hearing for public comments.

Seeing no hands, Mayor Parham closed the public hearing.

Council Member Myers made a motion to approve the ordinance. Vice Mayor Hill seconded the motion. The motion was approved on roll call vote. On roll call vote, voting yes: Cuthbert, Jones, Smith-Lee, Myers, Westbrook, Hill, and Parham

23-ORD-42 AN ORDINANCE, AS AMENDED, SAID ORDINANCE MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING JULY 1, 2023, AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2024, FOR THE SPECIAL REVENUE STREET OPERATIONS FUND IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,066,269.33.

- 9. <u>PUBLIC INFORMATION PERIOD</u>: A public information period, limited in time to 30 minutes, shall be part of an Order of Business at each regular council meeting. Each speaker shall be a resident or business owner of the City and shall be limited to three minutes. No speaker will be permitted to speak on any item scheduled for consideration on the regular docket of the meeting at which the speaker is to speak. The order of speakers, limited by the 30-minute time period, shall be determined as follows:
 - a) First, in chronological order of the notice, persons who have notified the Clerk no later than

- 12:00 noon of the day of the meeting,
- b) Second, in chronological order of their sign up, persons who have signed a sign-up sheet placed by the Clerk in the rear of the meeting room prior to the meeting.

Ken Pritchett, 1113 Overbrook Road, stated that he would like to know the status of the Lafayette Street Bridge and the Oakhill Bridge. He asked whether there was another court date for 1917 Powhatan Street. He stated that it has been two years since anything has been done with that property. He stated that he would also like to hear an update on the double houses that were mentioned at a meeting in the past. He stated it was told that information would come back but he has not heard anything regarding it. He stated that he has a representative from Truist Bank and Metropolitan Business League to help him present a check to the City of Petersburg in the amount of \$5,000 for beautification for the City of Petersburg.

Barbara Rudolph, 1675 Mt. Vernon Street, stated that she would like to go back in time to some previous actions. She stated that on March 19, 2019, the city council adopted a disposition process of city owned real estate property. She stated that in moving forward in time to October 18, 2022, the city council had a public hearing to authorize The Hotel Petersburg developer to use the parking lot adjacent to 135 North Union Street to facilitate redevelopment efforts. She stated that an ordinance was passed for this. She stated that at the July 26th meeting, there were closed session items added and it was not on an agenda that anyone was aware of. She stated that the action was to direct the city manager to negotiate and execute a purchase agreement for 135 North Union Street on terms consistent with the draft purchase agreement for The Hotel Petersburg. She stated that 135 North Union Street is City Hall. She stated that she is concerned about the Code of Virginia and the Constitution of Virginia that require a public hearing for disposition of real estate. She stated that there were some parts that were skipped over regarding the procedure to do this and that the super majority was not accounted for during the vote. She stated that he seems like it was intentionally handled in a way that there was no discussion about it. She stated that she hopes they go back to look at the procedure and also let them know what will become of city hall.

Mr. Williams stated that the code sections that Mrs. Rudolph cited are correct but that there has not been a conveyance of city hall. He stated that it would come back and require an ordinance and six votes. He stated that there has been a purchase agreement prepared for council but there has not been a conveyance of any kind as of yet.

Geneviene Lohr, 19 Guarantee Street, stated that a little while ago the city council passed the 2023-2024 Year Budget. She stated that included in that budget there was no raise or change in salaries for the employees. She stated that she brings this up because the average salary for the city employees is about \$52,000. She stated that between July 2022 and July 2023, inflation resulted in a difference of \$1,656. She stated that it means that the average city employee that is making \$52,000 has approximately \$1,600 less of buying power this year than last year. She stated that at the last meeting it was spoke on about the deficit of 110 employees of the City of Petersburg. She stated that they cannot expect to have all the positions in the city filled if the city is not properly compensating the employees or considering the fact that inflation occurs. She stated that at the last council meeting it was stated that \$6 million dollars was left from last year's budget and that \$3 million was sent to the fund balance and \$3 million was used to purchase lots downtown. She stated that to provide a 5% salary increase it would have cost approximately \$1.8 million. She stated that the city had that but would like to know why this was not considered.

Cory Harris, 2316 Anderson Street, stated that several weeks ago he was at a business meeting, and he lost his contract. He stated that the person that he was supposed to work with said that they do not deal with felons. He stated that the last time that he checked, he was not a felon. He stated that he knows where that source came from and that he will not put that information out publicly. He stated that Petersburg politics has always been messy. He stated that he does have evidence of the accusation of him being a felon, in which he is not. He stated that if his name is slandered one more time, he is going to sue the City of Petersburg. He stated that not only was he going to sue the city but everything that Florence Farley had given him he would

make public.

10. BUSINESS OR REPORTS FROM THE MAYOR OR OTHER MEMBERS OF CITY COUNCIL:

Council Member Cuthbert stated that there was a lead article in the Richmond Times Dispatch on 34% rate increase requested by ACQUA Virginia. He stated that he would see that coming six years ago when he fought for the city to keep from selling their water system.

Council Member Cuthbert showed pictures of 1917 Powhatan Avenue and the condition of the public for the public and council to see.

Council Member Cuthbert asked Mr. Altman if he could bring everyone up-to-date on the status of 1917 Powhatan Avenue.

Mr. Altman stated that the property did go to court. He stated that the court received a letter from the owner requesting a continuance. He stated that the City Attorney requested that the court not approve the continuance since this was their second violation. He stated that the judge agreed and found them guilty, and the owners were fined \$2,100 with a cumulative total of \$3,850. He stated that there are other civil suits pending with the property.

There was discussion among Council Member Cuthbert, Mr. Williams, and Mr. Altman with regards to the penalties and the status of 1917 Powhatan Avenue and the maintenance of the property.

Council Member Cuthbert asked Mr. VanVoorhees to put up a picture of 430 South Sycamore Street. He stated that the back of the house has a lot of problems with the structure. He asked Mr. Altman what the plan is to bring this property back into compliance with the building maintenance code.

Mr. Altman stated that Neighborhood Services took the property owner to court and the judge granted a continuance until October 20th.

Council Member Cuthbert asked Mr. Altman if he could bring the council up-to-date on the status and outcome of the court day at the November work session on 430 South Sycamore Street. He asked Mr. VanVoorhees to show the last photo of 125 North Market Street, the west side. He stated that six months ago the owner appealed against the decision of the Architectural Review Board. He stated that it was challenged on the denial of putting steel plates on the property. He asked Mr. Altman whether there was a plan to make the owner take the plates down.

Mr. Altman stated that the steel plates on the side are for a structural perspective. He stated that there are some bricks that are falling on the upper level of the building. He stated that they are working now to have a permanent safety system along the length of Market Street to protect the public. He stated that they are working with the property owner for an abatement plan as well.

There was discussion among Council Member Cuthbert, Mr. Williams, and Mr. Altman on whether there is a court date in place.

Mrs. Lucas stated that she wanted to remind the council that during business and reports from council each member has five minutes to give comments per their Rules of Council. She stated that moving forward there will be a time so that everyone is aware of how much time they have when giving their comments.

Council Member Jones stated that he would like to send prayers out to the Fitzgerald Family on the Loss of Mr. Fitzgerald, Sr. He stated that he would like to also send out the same to the family of Que Basnight, Allusion Barbershop Family, and the Pin Oaks Family on the loss of Queen Basnight. He stated that

he has an East Washington Street Business Meeting at the library at 12noon and 5pm. He stated that they are going to talk about the beautification of East Washington Street to Fort Gregg-Adams. He stated that over the weekend he witnessed something amazing over the weekend. He stated that there were at least 1,000 at the Sports Complex enjoying every field that the city had. He stated that double the amount is coming back next weekend. He stated that there were some things that needed to be taken care of that he wanted to speak with the city manager about. He wanted to make sure that all things are taken care of for the appearance of the Parks and Recreation and of the city. He stated that everyone enjoyed the asset.

Mr. Altman stated that he met with staff regarding the sports complex with the many people coming to visit the city. He stated that when they discuss the five-year capital improvement plan there will be some items that they will need to address. He stated that they have made significant strides this summer with the tournaments in regard to the improvements and grass cutting. He stated that they will continue working on it each week.

Council Member Jones stated that he understands the rule of not intervening with the city manager and him directing his name. He stated that it is not against the law for staff to have a conversation with any of the council members. He stated to Mr. Byerly, that when his employees are riding through the city, and they see grass they can just cut it. He stated that it is going to take everyone to work on the beautification of the city. He stated that he would like to call up Chief Christian and Mr. Talley. He stated that he has bracelets for people with autism and people that are hearing impaired. He stated that he is giving a bag of the bracelets to the police chief because his officers will be trained to identify and communicate with anyone that has the bracelet on. He stated that there are too many incidents all over the world of people getting shot because they have hearing issues or have autism. He stated that he would like the chief to share it with the fire department and EMS as well. He stated to the citizens that they have a responsibility as well when citizens are getting shot. He stated that there was an incident of a male getting shot and the grandmother was willing to cooperate, but the mother was not. He stated that either way if you look at it, if you do not do something about it you will get shot at again. He stated that people have to talk.

Council Member Westbrook stated that he would like to say Happy Hispanic Month. He stated that he was happy with the back-to-school movement when the students were welcome back to school. He stated that he hopes that the energy continues with the support of PTA meetings. He stated that he always hears that the PTA meetings are not supported. He stated that he wanted to shoutout and thank Governor Youngkin for coming to Pleasants Lane Elementary School and reading to the children. He stated that he would like everyone to support FOLAR in their cleanup of the city and the parks. He stated that he would like to piggy-back off Council Member Jones' comments on the overgrown grass in the easements throughout the city. He asked Mr. Byerly to check on 2051 Anchor Avenue. He stated that the city does own it, but the grass is never cut, and it makes the warehouse look bad. He stated that he hopes that the city and citizens can support the Trunk or Treat that will be on October 28th at the Sports Complex. He stated that there will be a senior trip this Wednesday to the State Fair. He stated that Albert Jones Field will also get a new scoreboard in the next two weeks. He stated that he would like to thank Sheriff Crawford and her efforts with the Blandford Parade for the Blandford Reunion. He stated to everyone to please keep coming out and share your concerns and to just keep rooting for the city to move forward.

Council Member Myers stated that there will be a Ward 5 meeting in October. He stated that he would like to follow up with Council Member Jones and Westbrook comments on the beautification of the city. He stated that there needs to be some leadership in the Director of Public Works directing their employees to do their job. He stated that the city looks horrible, and it has never looked this bad.

Council Member Smith-Lee stated that today is the first day of registration for voting. She stated that she wanted to thank the volunteers for helping to build the playground at Cool Springs Elementary. She stated that there were about 80 people doing the work to try and make sure that the children have something nice at

the school. She stated that she would like to pray for the two students at Virginia State University and their families with the tragedy that happened to both of those students. She stated that it is unbelievable that when you send children to college, and you get a call that they have both been killed. She stated that it is really sad, and that the city has to continue to pray for the community and the students at Virginia State University. She stated that she has to piggy-back of Council Member Westbrook comments of the Albert Jones Field. She stated that there will be lights put up on the field at the beginning of the year. She stated that she is excited for the kids, the community, and Albert Jones Field.

Vice Mayor Hill stated that he would like to remind everyone that he will be having a Ward 2 Meeting on September 21st at Good Shepherd Baptist Church at 6pm. He stated that they will be talking about a lot of great topics. He asked Mr. Altman to look at the containers of clothing and shoes in Butterworth's parking lot. He stated that years ago he had fought to have them removed. He stated that he has a picture of it. He stated that this past weekend there was a walk against crime and that he wants to commend everyone for attending. He stated that he read information in the paper stating that no one from the city council attended the walk. He stated that they have attended so many walks against crime and violence seminars. He stated that they do not get put in the paper for attending but the one time that they do not attend they are put in the paper. He thanked Council Member Jones for the bracelets on autism. He stated that he has an autistic son and that he will be giving him a bracelet as well. He stated that he is glad that others are seeing the things that are not being done and taken care of in the city by public works. He stated that if they go to spray chemicals to not spray anyone's yard. He stated that there was a case when someone's yard got sprayed and the city had to replace the yard and greenery.

Mayor Parham stated that he would like to thank Chief Christian and all the police officers on doing an excellent job on keeping the city safe. He stated that something that they do not get enough comments on is that the city's police officers are getting the bad guys off the street. He stated that he met with the president of VSU and that they are grateful for the work that Chief Christian and his officers are doing. He asked that everyone please begin to use the Petersburg Police Apps that are currently in place. He stated that if people know something please say something and that they can do it through the new app. He stated that there was a great re-entry forum in the city last week hosted by Sheriff Crawford. He stated that he would like to thank the sheriff and her staff for such a great event. He stated that there will be a ribbon cutting tomorrow for Kaboom Playground and he would like everyone to join them. It will be at Cool Springs at 10am. He stated that it is another great asset for the youth in the city. He stated that on September 30th it is the Joy Run Walk. He stated that it is something that they will be participating in. He stated that if you ride down Halifax Street you can see a hearse and a casket out at Tabernacle Baptist Church saying to please bury guns and not people. He stated that also he would like to comment on the information from Vice Mayor Hill on the Walk Against Crime. He stated that the clerk stated that the council did not get an invite to the event. He stated that in the future please send it to the clerk, Mrs. Nykesha Lucas, so that she can put it on everyone's calendar. He stated that Mr. Croker just completed another great year of Jazz in the Stacks at the library. He stated that the Walk Against Hunger will be on October 7th beginning at 10am. He stated that they ask that everyone join them and that it will be a three-mile walk. He stated that also at the library he is participating in something for Community in Schools. He stated that he was raising money for Petersburg schools at the library. He stated that he will be participating with "Dancing with the Stars." He stated that it will be on September 30th at the library. He stated that all proceeds will go to the Community in Schools Program.

BACKGROUND: The City of Petersburg received a petition to rezone the property located at 3287 County Drive from B-2 General Commercial Zoning District to M-1 Light Industrial Zoning District.

The Planning Commission is scheduled to hold a public hearing and consider a resolution with a recommendation to the City Council regarding the petition on May 4, 2023.

The public hearing was held on July 26, 2023, at the regular city council meeting. Council asked to defer until September 19, 2023, as staff worked with Prince George regarding next steps with collaboration, permitting, and revenue.

Staff asks that this item be deferred until Prince George completes their Comprehensive Plan Amendment to accommodate the project.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the City Council consider an ordinance approving a petition to rezone the property located at 3287 County Drive from B-2 General Commercial Zoning District to M-1 Light Industrial Zoning District.

Naomi Siodmok, Director of Planning and Community Development gave an update on the request for rezoning for property at 3287 County Drive and stated that she recommends deferment of the request until Prince George has made their decision.

BACKGROUND: The Central Virginia Waste Management Authority (CVWMA) is a public service authority that implements solid waste management and recycling programs for thirteen local governments. Since its formation in 1990, the CVWMA has endeavored to provide efficient and economical waste management and recycling solutions for its member jurisdictions. The CVWMA's aim is to meet the local governments' waste management and recycling needs, through improving exiting services and programs and expanding into new program areas. A board of directors including representatives from each member locality governs the actions of the authorities and daily operations are coordinated by experienced staff.

RECOMMENDATION: Jerry Byerly and Randall Williams' positions align with the requirements of CVWMA. It is recommended that they be appointed to the Central Virginia Waste Management Authority Board with Mr. Byerly as primary and Mr. Williams as alternate.

Mrs. Lucas gave an update on the board and request for appointment.

WHEREAS, the City of Petersburg received a proposal from Bird Rides, Inc. to operate a Standup Electric Scooter sharing system within the City of Petersburg; and

WHEREAS, Bird Rides, Inc. was founded in 2017 and operates in 25 Countries and 400 Cities; and

WHEREAS, the system works through an online application whereby users sign a user agreement verify their age is 18 or older, add payments, complete educational tutorials prior to each ride; and

WHEREAS, the system is dockless and riders have freedom to choose drop off and pick-up locations and Operators locate and retrieve scooters throughout the day; and

WHEREAS, the cost is \$1.00 per minute, with an average cost of \$6.00; and

WHEREAS, Discounts are offered to veterans, senior citizens, healthcare workers, and students with Pell grants; and

WHEREAS, the purpose is to provide a low-cost transportation alternative, with focus on the first and last mile between a departure location and a destination; and

WHEREAS, Operating zones can be established to limit use within specific target areas; and

WHEREAS, the agreement between the City and Bird includes, liability, insurance and indemnification clauses; and

WHEREAS, each rider must sign an agreement that includes liability and indemnification clauses as well; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the requirements of Title 15.2-2204 of the Code of Virginia, as amended, this is a public hearing and consideration of an ordinance authorizing the City Manager to execute a Pilot Operating Agreement between the City of Petersburg and Bird Rides, Inc. to establish a stand-up electric scooter sharing system within the City of Petersburg, and the public hearing was advertised, in accordance with applicable laws.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, that the City Council of the City of Petersburg hereby authorizes the City Manager to execute a Pilot Operating Agreement between the City of Petersburg and Bird Rides, Inc. to establish a stand-up electric scooter sharing system within the City of Petersburg.

PILOT OPERATING AGREEMENT

This Pilot Operating Agreement (the "Agreement") is entered into by and between Bird Rides, Inc., located at 8605 Santa Monica Blvd. #20388 West Hollywood, CA 90069 ("Company"), and The City of Petersburg located at 135 N Union Street, Petersburg, VA 23803 (the "City") as of ______, 2023.

1. Statement and Purpose

The purpose of this Agreement is to establish interim rules and regulations governing the pilot operation of a Stand-up Electric Scooter sharing system within the City while this Agreement is in effect (the "Pilot"), and to ensure that the Pilot is consistent with the safety and well-being of bicyclists, pedestrians, and other users of the public rights-of-way.

2. Scope

This Agreement and its terms apply to any proposed deployment of Stand-up Electric Scooter sharing systems within City's jurisdictional boundaries. This Agreement and the Pilot shall remain in effect for a period of twelve months and shall automatically renew for successive twelve month periods unless either party provides written notice to the other of its intention not to renew at least ninety (90) days prior to the end of the then-current term.

3. Procedures

While this Agreement is in effect, Company shall be the sole provider of Stand-up Electric Scooter sharing systems within City's jurisdictional boundaries for the Pilot, contingent upon compliance with the terms of this Agreement. Upon effectiveness of this Agreement, Company shall provide an affidavit of compliance with the terms of this Agreement and provide appropriate indemnification.

4. Operating Regulations

- a. Company, and/or its service providers, agents or assigns, shall be responsible for operating a Stand-up Electric Scooter program in the City with the below requirements.
- b. "Stand-up Electric Scooter" shall mean a device weighing less than 150 pounds, that (i) has handlebars and an electric motor, (ii) is solely powered by the electric motor and/or human power, and (iii) has a maximum speed of no more than 20 mph on a paved level surface when powered solely by the electric motor.
- c. Except as otherwise provided herein, City shall regulate the operation of Stand-up Electric Scooters in a manner no more restrictive than City's regulation of bicycles.
- d. Stand-up Electric Scooters are to be ridden on streets, and where available, in bike lanes and bike paths. Stand-up Electric Scooters are to stay to the right of street lanes and to offer the right of

way to bicycles in bike lanes and on bike paths. Users of Stand-up Electric Scooters shall be 18 or older. Users of Stand-up Electric Scooters who violate these provisions may be fined by City consistent with fines for cyclists.

- e. Company shall provide easily visible contact information, including toll-free phone number and/or e-mail address on each Stand-up Electric Scooter for members of the public to make relocation requests or to report other issues with devices.
- f. Hours of operation when Company's Stand-up Electric Scooters will be made available to rent from 5 a.m. to midnight (local time).

5. Parking

- a. Users of Stand-up Electric Scooters shall park devices upright in the furniture zone of the sidewalk, beside a bicycle rack or in another area specifically designated for bicycle parking, or on the street next to an unmarked curb.
- b. Users shall not park Stand-up Electric Scooters in such a manner as to block the pedestrian clear zone area of the sidewalk; any fire hydrant, call box, or other emergency facility; bus bench; or utility pole or box.
- c. Users shall not park Stand-up Electric Scooters in such a manner as to impede or interfere with the reasonable use of any commercial window display or access to or from any building.
- d. Users shall not park Stand-up Electric Scooters in such a manner as to impede or interfere with the reasonable use of any bicycle rack or news rack.
- e. Users may park Stand-up Electric Scooters on blocks without sidewalks only if the travel lane(s) and 6-foot pedestrian clear zone are not impeded.
- f. Users shall not park Stand-up Electric Scooters in the landscape/furniture zone directly adjacent to or within the following areas, such that access is impeded:
 - i. Transit zones, including bus stops, shelters, passenger waiting areas and bus layover and staging zones, except at existing bicycle racks;
 - ii. Loading zones;
 - iii. Disabled parking zone;
 - iv. Street furniture that requires pedestrian access (e.g., benches, parking pay stations, bus shelters, transit information signs, etc.);
 - v. Curb ramps;
 - vi. Entryways; and
 - vii. Driveways.
- g. Users of Stand-up Electric Scooters who violate these provisions may be fined by City consistent with fines for cyclists.
- h. Company may stage its Stand-up Electric Scooters in permitted parking areas as described in this section. To the extent Company desires to stage Stand-up Electric Scooters in areas other than the public right-of-way, Company must first obtain the right to do so from the appropriate City department, property owner, or public agency.

6. Operations

- a. Company shall maintain 24-hour customer service for customers to report safety concerns, complaints, or to ask questions. Company shall maintain a multilingual website, call center, and/or mobile app customer interface that is available twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. The aforementioned shall be compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- b. In the event a safety or maintenance issue is reported for a specific device, that Stand-up Electric Scooter shall be made unavailable to users and shall be removed within the timeframes provided herein. Any inoperable or unsafe device shall be repaired before it is put back into service.
- c. Company shall respond to reports of incorrectly parked Stand-up Electric Scooters, Stand-up Electric Scooters continuously parked in one location for more than 36 hours, or unsafe/inoperable Stand-up Electric Scooters, by relocating, re-parking, or removing the Stand-up Electric Scooters, as appropriate, within 24 hours of receiving notice that must include the location of the Stand-up Electric Scooter.
- d. Company shall provide notice to all users that:
 - i. Stand-up Electric Scooters are to be ridden on streets, and where available, in bike lanes and bike paths;
 - ii. Stand-up Electric Scooters are to stay to the right of street lanes and to offer the right of way to bicycles on bike lanes and bike paths;
 - iii. Helmets are encouraged for all users;
 - iv. Parking must be done in the designated areas; and
 - v. Riding responsibly is encouraged.
- e. Stand-up Electric Scooter riders are required to take a photo whenever they park their scooter at the end of a ride.
- f. Company shall provide education to Stand-up Electric Scooter riders on the City's existing rules and regulations, safe and courteous riding, and proper parking.

7. Data Sharing

City may require Company to provide anonymized fleet and ride activity data for all trips starting or ending within the jurisdiction of City on any vehicle of Company or of any person or company controlled by, controlling, or under common control with Company, provided that, to ensure individual privacy:

- a. such data is provided via an application programming interface, subject to Company's license agreement for such interface, in compliance with a national data format specification such as the Mobility Data Specification;
- b. any such data provided shall be treated as trade secret and proprietary business information, shall not be shared to third parties without Company's consent, and shall not be treated as owned by the local authority; and

c. such data shall be considered personally identifiable information, and shall under no circumstances be disclosed pursuant to public records requests received by the local authority without prior aggregation or obfuscation to protect individual privacy.

8. Indemnification

Company agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless City (and City's employees, agents and affiliates) from and against all actions, damages or claims brought against City arising out of Company's negligence or willful misconduct, except that Company's indemnification obligation shall not extend to claims of City's (or City's employees', agents' or affiliates') negligence or willful misconduct. City expressly acknowledges that in no event shall Company be liable for any special, indirect, consequential or punitive damages. Company's indemnification obligations shall survive for a period of one (1) year after expiration of this Agreement. Company shall be released from its indemnification obligations under this section if the loss or damage was caused by the City's negligent construction or maintenance of public infrastructure. City's right to indemnification shall be contingent on City notifying Company promptly following receipt or notice of any claim; Company shall have sole control of any defense; City shall not consent to the entry of a judgment or enter into any settlement without the prior written consent of Company.

9. Insurance

Company shall provide City with proof of insurance coverage exclusively for the operation of Stand-up Electric Scooters including: (a) Commercial General Liability insurance coverage with a limit of no less than \$1,000,000.00 each occurrence and \$2,000,000.00 aggregate; (b) Automobile Insurance coverage with a limit of no less than \$1,000,000.00 each occurrence and \$1,000,000.00 aggregate; (c) Umbrella or Excess Liability coverage with a limit of no less than \$5,000,000.00 each occurrence/aggregate; and (d) where Company employs persons within the City , Workers' Compensation coverage of no less than the statutory requirement.

10. Miscellaneous

a. All notices and communications to the City from Company shall be made in writing (includes electronic communications) and sent to the address below.

b. In carrying out their responsibilities, the parties shall remain independent contractors, and nothing herein shall be interpreted or intended to create a partnership, joint venture, employment, agency, franchise or other form of agreement or relationship.

c. This agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the <u>Commonwealth of Virginia</u>.



The subject property is addressed as 2744 S Crater Road, further identified as TP# 065140005, and currently zoned B-2, General Commercial District which requires the approval of an overlay district of a **Special Use Permit for the proposed hand car wash & detailing use.**

Project Summary

The applicant, Mr. Phelps has been in the car wash and auto detailing business for over 20 years, once operating at the corner of N Jefferson Street and E Washington St and the corner of 601 E Wythe St and S Little Church Street. The applicant also operated a business in Prince George County, Virginia across Oaklawn Blvd and The Crossings Shopping Center located in the vicinity of 5201 Oaklawn Blvd near Dairy Queen and on property addressed as 5298 Plaza Dr, Millers Neighborhood Market, just in front of the Food Lion Grocery Store.



Mr. Phelps would like to continue operating as an entrepreneur in the City of Petersburg, Virginia city limits at the subject property addressed as 2744 S Crater Road. The applicant has been operating from the property under the assumption that because the structure had been built as an automated car wash when the Shell Service Station was in operation in 1994, the use was permitted by right. Upon the Zoning Administrator performing field inspections she recognized the operation and informed Mr. Phelps of the zoning regulations and requirements related to car washing and automobile detailing uses in the City of Petersburg. Hence, the application submittal.

The Zoning Ordinance was amended on May 1, 2001, by ordinance 01-ORD-23 to require a Special Use Permit for stand-alone vehicle repair uses per Article23 of the Zoning Ordinance.

Article 3 Definitions. Section 2. Definitions. The ordinance defines a stand-alone vehicle repair shop: A business which is engaged in the provision of general repairs to motor vehicles, including the serving or rebuilding of engines and transmissions, vehicle suspensions, vehicle electrical, hydraulic, or fuel systems, or the provision of major overhauls and maintenance, or minor repairs and routine maintenance to vehicles or parts thereof, and the washing or waxing of vehicles either through the use of automated devices or by hand. The term "stand alone vehicle repair shop" shall not include the painting of vehicles, bodywork or framework performed on vehicles. Neither shall the term "stand alone vehicle repair shop" apply to the service shops of franchised new vehicle dealerships licensed as such by the Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles Dealer Services Division.

Mr. Phelps has operated a clean, well-maintained business since initially going into business and desires to continue operating and growing his business establishment in the city of Petersburg where he has roots. The property is kept free of outside storage of equipment and materials. (See Photos)

If approved, the applicant will be required to delineate the required parking spaces for ease of vehicle flow.



Existing and Surrounding Zoning

The subject property is zoned B-2, General Commercial District and predominantly all the properties fronting along S. Crater Road from Fort Mahone St (Wendy's) just beyond Rives Rd are zoned B-2, as well. The Walnut Hill Shopping Center area and Food Lion Plaza are zoned B-1, Shopping Center District. Just south of the subject property along Park Ave, are the Swift Creek Mill Apartments. The Battlefield Park Residential Subdivision is located along E Park, N Park, and South Park Dr. There is a heavily wooded area to the immediate south of the property between the proposed business and residential areas.



ARTICLE 23. SUPPLEMENTARY USE REGULATIONS – SPECIAL USES

Section 1. [Procedure for obtaining special use permit.]

Recognizing that certain uses may be desirable when located in the community, but that these uses may be incompatible with other uses permitted in a district, certain special uses listed in section 4, below, when found to be in the interest of the public health, safety, morals and general welfare of the community, may be permitted in any district from which they are prohibited. Before the location or establishment thereof, or before any change of use of the premises existing at the time of the effective date of the regulations, or permitted as herein provided, is made, preliminary plans in sufficient detail, and a statement as to the proposed use of the buildings, structures and premises, shall be submitted to the planning commission. The commission shall hold a public hearing as provided in article 28, and shall review such plans and statements and shall, after a careful study thereof and of the effect that such buildings, structures or uses will have upon the surrounding territory, submit a recommendation to the city council Following receipt of the within thirty (30) days following said hearing. commission's report, the city council may permit such buildings, structures or uses, where requested; provided, that the public health, safety, morals, and general welfare will not be adversely affected, that ample off-street parking facilities will be provided, and that necessary safeguards will be provided for the protection of surrounding property, persons, and neighborhood values.

Section 2. [Qualification of nonconforming use as special use.]

Any special use listed in section 4, below, existing at the effective date of these regulations, shall be considered a nonconforming use, unless it has qualified as provided above, and has been approved as a "special use" by the city council.

Section 3. [Additions or alterations to special uses.]

When [such changes are] found to be in the interest of the public health, safety, morals, and general welfare, the board of zoning appeals is hereby authorized to approve any and all additions or structural alterations to special uses after they have qualified and have been approved by the city council.

Supp. No. 5

Section 4. Special uses enumerated.

The following special uses may be approved by the council, as provided in this article:

- (1) Airports and landing fields;
- (2) Circus or carnival grounds, temporary for a specified period;
- (3) Drive-in theater;
- (4) Fairgrounds;
- (5) Public utilities or public service uses, buildings, structures or appurtenances thereto, including limited off-street parking adjoining, or adjacent to, the property when located in a residence district; provided no business involving the repair, servicing or sale, or display of vehicles shall be conducted on such parking area; and no structures, including signs, will be erected on the parking area; and no charge will be made for parking within the premises; and the parking will be set back from the street in keeping with the existing front and side yard regulations of the residence district;
- (6) Public or government buildings;
- (7) Hospitals or sanitariums;
- (8) Cemetery;
- (9) Sports arena or stadium;
- (10) Race track;
- (11) Radio or television tower or broadcasting station;
- (12) Child care centers in residential district.
- (13) Bed and breakfast inn in R-3, R-4, R-5, and RB districts meeting the following requirements:
 - (a) Permitted capacity of two (2) persons per sleeping room, not to exceed a maximum of twenty (20) persons per structure;
 - (b) One-half (1/2) off-street parking space per sleeping room;
 - (c) Resident-manager on premises;
 - (d) Permitted sign area not to exceed two (2) square feet;
 - (e) Other requirements as deemed necessary to provide for the protection of surrounding property, persons, and neighborhood values.

- (14) Operations involving shredding, cutting or otherwise processing of used or discarded tires, or operations involving the storage, distribution, or sale of used tires or discarded tires if more than two hundred (200) such tires are located on site, even if such operation is ancillary to the main use of the site. Notwithstanding any other regulations within this article, these uses may only be permitted in M-1 and M-2 zoning districts.
- (15) Nightclub in B-2 and M-1 zoning district only.
- (16) Boarding, rooming, or lodging houses such to be permitted only in R-5 and B-2 zoning districts.
- (17) Convalescent and nursing homes such to be permitted only in R-5 and B-2 zoning districts.
- (18) Adult book store, adult entertainment establishment, adult motion picture theater and adult video store such to be permitted only in the B-2 zoning district.
- (19) Vehicle rebuilder, such to be allowed only in the M-1 and M-2 zoning districts.
- (20) Vehicle removal operator, vehicle storage lot, or vehicle tow lot, such to be permitted within the m-1 and M-2 zoning districts only.
- (21) Auto body shop and vehicle painting operations not accessory to a new-vehicle dealership such to be permitted only in the B-2, M-1, and M-2 zoning districts only.
- (22) Stand-alone used vehicle sales not associated with a new-vehicle dealership or not located upon the same parcel as such new-vehicle dealership, if located upon parcels of less than one acre in area, such to be permitted within the B-2 and M-1 zoning districts only.
- (23) Stand-alone vehicle repair, to include general automobile repair shops, truck repair shops, transmission repair shops, engine repair shops, car washes or car washing and detailing operations, and similar facilities, such to be permitted within the B-2 and M-1 zoning districts only.

- (24) Small engine repair shop to be allowed within the B-2 and M-1 zoning districts only.
- (25) Tractor-trailer service station, to be allowed within the B-2, M-1, and M-2 zoning districts only.
- (26) Automobile service stations, to be permitted within the B-2, M-1, and M-2 zoning districts only.
- (27) Boat, semi-trailer truck, or recreational vehicle dealerships, to be allowed in the B-2 and M-1 zoning districts only.
- (28) Contractor storage yards such to be permitted within the m-1 and M-2 zoning districts only.
- (29) Mulching or composting facilities or yards such to be permitted within the M-1 and M-2 zoning districts only.
- (30) Mini-storage facilities or self-storage facilities such uses permitted within the B-2, M-1, and M-2 zoning districts only.
- (31) Homeless shelter.
- (32) Private Jails, halfway houses, or private prisons, whether for-profit or non-profit, such to be permitted within the B-2 zoning district only.
- (33) Hotels and motels providing fewer than forty-five (45) guest rooms, such to be permitted within the B-1, B-2, B-3, and MXD-2 Districts only.
- (34) Mobile home sales or the sales, storage, or display of modular housing units or mobile homes, such to be permitted within the M-1 District only.



Speed Control: How it works

VLS | Vehicle Location System

All vehicles are pre-loaded with map data so when a Bird enters a predetermined geospeed zone, the Vehicle Location System (VLS) triggers and the vehicle automatically slows



BirdOS, Bird's proprietary operating system is dynamically preloaded with the local GPS feed as the vehicle travels so there are **no data delays** from having to download geolocation data from the cloud.



Map data is **cross-checked against current vehicle location** to pinpoint the precise speed limit, no ride zone or other designation (e.g. permitted parking zone) assigned to that location.








Fleet Manager Model
